A GLIMPSE INTO ~~~ MODENA

This month the area of Modena is featured – the hometown of Lucia Roncalgia of Lower Hutt. Modena is the 34th known area of Italia where our Club's members originate from. Modena is located in the Po Valley, a large fertile area south of Milan and north of Florence, in the Emilia-Romagna region in northern Italy. Approximately 180.000 people live in Modena and the province has one of the higher population densities in the national average (230 inhabitants per km²). This is because of its central position, and the high concentration of industries and agriculture production that makes Modena one of the most important centres of trade between northern and southern Italy and between Italy and the rest of the world.

The first signs of human settlement in Modena date from the Palaeolithic Age and are evidenced by the numerous finds today collected in the Civic Museum. Etruscans, Celts and Romans settled in the area and the echoes of them still remain in the names of some of the city's streets. Unfortunately, not a single building from the Romans survived to modern times, but the Estense Museum has a large collection of relicts from monuments, sarcophagi and tombstones to bear witness to this former greatness.

After the fall of the Roman Empire, the area was invaded by barbarian populations from northern Europe and from the 5th to the 9th centuries Modena fell into a period of great decline. It was only at the end of the 9th century that the reconstruction process began and continued along the Medieval Age. The greatest evidence of trade and arts flourishing during the Medieval Age in Modena is given by the Cathedral, a beautiful example of Romanesque architecture built in the 12th century and regarded as one of the greatest masterpieces of Romanesque art to be found anywhere in Europe. Work on the Cathedral began in 1099, over the site of the sepulchre of Saint Geminianus, Modena's patron saint who probably died on January 31, of the year 397. The Saint's remains are still exhibited in the cathedral's crypt and his feast day is held on 31st January every year.



From the beginning of the 14th century and during the Renaissance period, Modena, like many other towns located in Italy, was under the control of an aristocratic family: the Estense family, who owned most of Emilia. For centuries, Italy was divided into several dukedoms and counties, whose existence promoted the development of different regional cultures, dialects and economies. The unification of the kingdom of Italy in 1861 merged all these cultures making Italy one nation, characterised by one common language and a common patriotic feeling. After the unification, Modena found itself no longer the capital of a duchy but an ordinary provincial town that still is.

Of primary importance in Modena is the motor industry: the names of Ferrari, Maserati, Lamborghini, Bugatti and De Tomaso, are renowned worldwide as the World's 'Supercar Capital'. Road car models are highly esteemed and have become prestigious collectors' items for someone. Most of the production is aimed at export. Engineering and mechanical sector is also particularly oriented towards agriculture machinery whose first major period of development dates back in the thirties.

Finally, it should be mentioned that Luciano Pavarotti was born and lived most of his life in Modena. In October 2007, the two-century-old Comunale opera house in town was renamed *Teatro Luciano Pavarotti*.
