### ITALIAN MASS


The next Italian Mass will be held on Sunday 4 May 2008 at 11.30am at St Francis de Sales Church, Island Bay.

#### ***COASTGUARD COLLEAGUES SIGN MEMORANDUM***

President Giuseppe Marino and Secretary Elia Manetta of La Societa Nazionale di Salvamento, Coast Guard Auxiliary of Italy, arrived in Wellington in mid February, to sign a 'Memorandum of Understanding' with Coastguard New Zealand.

The signing took place at the invitation of His Excellency, Dr.Gioacchino Trizzino, Ambassador of Italy, who warmly welcomed Ian Coard, National President of Coastguard New Zealand. The Deputy Mayor of Wellington, Ian McKinnon, witnessed the signatures which will provide sister service status and will focus entirely on the humanitarian work of both organizations.

The delegation's week long stay also included a visit to the Maritime New Zealand's Rescue Co-ordination Centre, communication with the Italian Antarctic supply ship "Italica", attending Sunday Mass at St. Francis de Sales Church, Island Bay, Wellington, before taking part in the annual "Blessing of the Boats" in Island Bay.
