Francesca Costa

Club member Francesca Maria Costa, daughter of the late Bartolo Costa and Maria Luisa Costa (nee Panettieri), has completed a Masters Thesis on the experiences of second-generation Strombolani women living in New Zealand. 'Le Strombolane' traces the lives of several women whose parent/s originated from the island of Stromboli, Southern Italy. This research focuses on their Catholic schooling during the 1950s – 1970s and the impact of two cultures on their learning process. It depicts the disadvantage of Italian and other ethnic children, during this period, due to language and other differences, and highlights the influence of teachers and parental attitudes on their education outcomes. The formation of identity in Italian descendants is also a feature of this study, which emphasises that, while each woman in the study describes themselves as New Zealanders, they also claim a strong loyalty to their Italian heritage.

Francesca draws comparisons with Australian studies on Southern Italian women, which emphasise a resurgence of cultural identity for many second-generation descendants, who adopt the role of 'cultural guardians' of their traditional values and practices for future generations. This study relates a similar role for Strombolani descendants, in their concern that the stories of 'home', related by their parents and grandparents and their Strombolani dialect may eventually become lost.

A copy of 'Le Strombolane', will be presented to the Club Garibaldi later this year. It will also be available through the Victoria University library.

Club Italia Nelson – 75TH Jubilee **By Ginette**

When our sister club, Club Italia in Nelson, recently celebrated their 75th jubilee, Robin and I, as Club Garibaldi's representatives, had the pleasure of attending a great day of friendship and celebration. The following is a brief history of the club.

On 11 December 1931, a group of Italian immigrants sat on the church steps in Nelson and had their photograph taken. Mostly farmers and fishermen, they represented their wives and young families and formed the backbone of a newly established local Italian community. On this day, they celebrated the grand opening of Club Italia Nelson. Today, only one foundation member survives - Jim Romano. Over the years the club has operated from three different premises, and in 1957, a property was purchased in Trafalgar Road.

The day of celebrations commenced at the clubrooms with the group 'Italian Singers Nelson' and the Italian community singing the Italian national anthem, before a Mass Celebration by Father Patrick Bridgeman, who is the club's patron. Nelson's Mayor, Paul Matheson, was also in attendance. Following Mass, lively conversation was shared in between delicious nibbles and drinks until it was time for a full lunch at the Trailways Hotel.

It was really pleasing to see the hotel venue filled to capacity, with nearly 200 guests, including children. Once seated, we were welcomed by the MC, Fred Persico - and so, a wonderful afternoon was shared. Following the official formalities we were again, entertained by the Italian Singers Nelson, with popular Italian songs, and Dominic Esposito of Melbourne, playing the violin. This was followed by awards given to two hard working, long standing members, Jim Romano and Francie Di Leva, and the cutting of a beautifully decorated celebratory cake.

A Bit of Trivia!

CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS CAME FROM PIEDMONT!

Turin - 14 June 2006

Historians are claiming that Christopher Columbus came from a tiny Piedmont village and not the bustling port of Genoa.

Turin is holding a conference soon, which numerous descendants of Columbus will attend, to explore the Piedmontese origin of the great explorer on the basis of recent Italian and international discoveries.

The organisers of the conference say that Columbus was born in Cuccaro Monferrato, south-east of Turin - a village which today, has just 370 inhabitants.

Giorgio Casartelli, head of the village's Columbus Centre, claims he has proof of Columbus' origins. He quoted 'In an inheritance case in 1608, a decision was handed down by the Spanish Colonial Council of the Indies, said that Columbus belong to the family of Colombos of Curraro'. Christopher Columbus in Italian is Cristoforo Colombo.

Casartelli said there is also further proof. A Seville University lecturer, Angelica Valentinetti has manusrcipts which she discovered in the Spanish State Archives in Madrid, and another Italian researcher will present unpublished documents from Turin's State Archives, relating to the explorer's exploits as a young man.


The generally accepted view that Columbus was the son of a Genoese wool trader, Domenico Colombo, has been challenged over the years. Several Spanish scholars have contended he was of noble Spanish or Catalan origin, and an Italian historian, Renato Biagioli claims he was the illegitimate son of a Roman noblewoman and a Pope, who fathered him as a teenager, before he entered the Church.

It will be most interesting to see what conclusion the conference reaches.

Glimpse into ~~~ Ferrara **By Ginette Toscano Page**

This month Ferrara is featured, the area where Felice Benvenuti was born and raised. Giorgio Benvenuti of Lower Hutt, although born in Tivoli, was also raised in Ferrara.

Ferrara is in the Emilia-Romagna region and capital city of the province of Ferrara, situated along the Po River, south of Venice and Padua, and north north-east of Bologna.





the inhabitants of the Lagoons at the mouth of the River Po, and **Giorgio Benvenuti** dates back around 1300 years when it was a Byzantine military fortified city. In 1115, the city became a free commune and in 1135, the Romanesque Cathedral was built.

The Este family ruled Ferrara from 1208 to 1598, constructing many of the wonderful monuments we enjoy today. Under the Estes, Ferrara became a centre for the arts. Leonardo da Vinci, Raphael, Titian and Petrarch, among others, spent time under

their patronage. As the Estes did not have a male heir, the Pope claimed Ferrara and it became part of the Papal States. A fortress called Castel Tedaldo, constructed by Pope Paul VI, was occupied by an Austrian garrison from 1832 until 1859, until it became part of the Kingdom of Italy.

The city is surrounded by more than 9 kilometres of ancient walls, built between 1493 and 1505, with walking paths on top, and the most prominent building is the square Castello Estense - a brick building surrounded by a moat, with four towers, built in 1385.

Ferrara has many early Renaissance palaces, and one of the finest is Palazzo dei Diamanti, so named for the diamond points into which the facade's stone block are cut. It houses the National Picture Gallery which first came to prominence in the second half of the 15th century.

Some noted masters of the 16th century School of Ferrara (Painting) include Dosso Dossi, Girolamo da Carpi and Benvenuto Tisio (il Garofalo).

The Palium of St George is a typical medieval feast held every year on the last Sunday of May, and the Buskers Festival is a parade of the best street musicians in the world. In terms of tradition, it is the most important festival of its kind.
