One minute silence in memory of Aldo Cuccurullo before start of soccer match

The venue for the game was Te Whaea park, the new artificial pitch by the Wellington Show Buildings, and proved to be a wonderful surface on which to play a game of football. The game started at a high tempo, with both sides looking to attack in the knowledge that a drawn result would lead to a penalty shoot-out (thanks to a foolish change in the rules initiated by the writer after last year's game!).

Both sides proceeded to convert their penalties with composure and decisiveness, until the Club Italia keeper made a good save to repel one of our kicks. Lupi, who buried it with aplomb, and sent the Club Italia players and supporters into raptures, as Club Italia had reclaimed the Cup after 5 years of unsuccessful challenges.

ITALIAN NAMING TRADITIONS

This is the traditional pattern for naming children in Italy:

The first son is named after the father's father.

The second son is named after the mother's father.

The first daughter is named after the father's mother.

The second daughter is named after the mother's mother.

This was custom and tradition not law, so it varied. However, most couples if they knew who their parents were and were on good terms with them, stuck to this tradition especially in Southern Italy. People are individuals so you will find couples who were very respectful of their Italian tradition yet still felt compelled to exercise their own free will. Therefore, you will find families that follow no specific pattern in naming their children, sometimes naming the children after the patron saint of the day, patron saint of the town, or since the arrival of television in the 1950's, they are often named after a popular celebrity or star in television programmes - whatever they feel right to do at the time.

There are a few standard variations. If the first born or second born child (one given the paternal or maternal grandparent's name) died as an infant or young child, the name of the deceased baby or child was often given to the next newborn. Another naming variation is that if the first born is a girl, some parents, wanting to show respect and love for the paternal grandfather (and also for good luck) gave the girl a female variation of her paternal grandfather's name such as: Angela for Angelo, Antonia/Antonio, Benedetta/Benedetto, Carla/Carlo, and Donata/Donato. Other children are frequently named for Patron Saints or relatives. Almost all Italian Catholic children have a saint's name in their personal litany of given names. Many children in Italy are given more than one middle name and some children are given many names at birth to make all the relatives and saints happy!

The tradition is still practiced in many places especially in the smaller towns where traditions have not been disregarded. Nicknames are derived from a personal characteristic of the individual and a person is known by his or her nickname throughout life. In addition, entire families have nicknames too, but that is another story!



REMEMBERING THE SANTINA - FAMILY REACHES OUT

November 5 will mark 59 years since Mattia Amitrano left Italy for Island Bay. Eighteen years earlier, his father Gennaro had disappeared at sea on September 25, 1933. He was one of the four crew who left Island Bay on the Santina, a fishing launch whose wreckage was found after its engine broke down in a southerly storm.

Today, Mattia's family members, including wife Emma, and daughters Annalisa Devitt and Ida Di Leva, are seeking the relatives of the crew, as they pursue an application to set up a memorial chair by the old bait house, now the Marine Education Centre.

They are currently waiting for the city council's decision.

"The whole thing is to find relations of the three crew: Vincenzo Costa, Paolo Panozzo and Ronald Alley. The idea is for families of these three people to come forward if they want to be involved with setting up this memorial ... We thought of doing it because there has never been any plot of any kind to commemorate. There is no grave or anything. It is some where for the next generation to visit and to know the history of what happened." says Annalisa, of Grenada Village.

The Amitrano family expects the chair to be unveiled in February 2011 at the Blessing of the Boats, the annual ritual which takes place during the Island Bay Festival and was started after the Santina's crew disappeared to protect other boat crews from the sea.

The Santina's story is also quite a big part of Island Bay's history, and many people know about it, they say.

Gennaro left Italy to work as a fisherman in Island Bay in 1925. Most Italian fishermen used to bring their families along with them, but his wife Giuseppina didn't want to come to New Zealand.

So Gennaro left behind his three children, and Giuseppina, who was pregnant with Mattia at the time. "When he died, dad was seven. He never met his father," says Annalisa.

Giuseppina only was informed of her husband's death through a letter she received 40 days later.

One of Mattia's sisters came to Wellington to settle down afterwards, and asked him to come over in 1951. So like his father, Mattia became a fisherman in Island Bay. He went back to Italy in 1957 where he married Emma, and they came back soon after. They have four children and nine grandchildren.

Mattia's sister Rosalia who passed away had three children and seven grandchildren, his sister Anna who lives in Italy has three children and five grandchildren, and his brother Salvatore who passed away had a son.

MOUNT STREET CEMETERY BLESSING SERVICE

On 31 October about 200 people gathered at the Mount Street Cemetery to attend a service of blessing and remembrance led by Archbishop John Dew to commemorate the 170th anniversary of the cemetery's consecration. The following is a prayer which was read out by Donato Scioscioli, Second Secretary from the Italian Embassy, which was translated by Marco Sonzogni from the Italian Programme at Victoria university. Other prayers were read in Maori, French, Polish and English.

"Per tutte le persone che abitano in questa città: rafforza, O Signore, il nostro senso di comunità; aiutaci a rispettare tutte le culture e gli stili di vita che formano il tessuto sociale in cui viviamo; liberaci da ogni forma di pregiudizio; aiutaci ad essere sempre compassionevoli con il prossimo e a non giudicare mai nessuno. Ascoltaci, O Signore."

"For the people of this city: strengthen our sense of community; help us to respect the great diversity of cultures and life-styles that form the fabric of social life; free us from prejudice; help us to place compassion before judgment in every situation. Lord hear us."

Mount Street Cemetery was Wellington's main Catholic cemetery until 1891, although burials in existing family plots continued until 1954. The Friends of the Mount Street Cemetery committee have organised working bees to restore the overgrown cemetery. About 200 headstones survive, but it is estimated there could be as many as 800 graves. An initial burial list has been completed and can be viewed online at mountstreetcemetery.org

As mentioned in the March newsletter earlier this year some initial tidying up work has been done in the Cemetery and some graves of Italian pioneer families in Wellington have been located. The following families have had family members buried at Mount Street: Biancini, Cenci, Cimino, Corrado, Rosetta Lulah Kane, Livorno, Joseph Brennan Ligouri McDonald, Vitali-Innocenti, and Matteo Tanzabel.

The committee would be interested to hear from anyone who may be a descendant of these families or know any information about these families in Wellington, or have information about others who may have been buried in the Cemetery.
