`NATURA' – CONTEMPORARY ART EXHIBITION BY SICILIAN ARTIST, ALESSANDRO BAZAN, OPENS IN WELLINGTON ON 14 SEPTEMBER 2012



An exhibition of contemporary art by renowned Sicilian artist, Alessandro Bazan will open at the Academy Gallery, New Zealand Academy of Fine Arts, in Wellington on Friday, 14 September 2012.

Liz Maxwell, President of the Italian Chamber of Commerce New Zealand Inc. says, "Alessandro Bazan has become one of Italy's best-known and contemporary artists, a modern Sicilian master, as well as a fascinating character. We are confident that his art will speak to New Zealanders and the Italian community in this country.

Each year, the Sicilian Region, looks to strengthen, through cultural events, the ties between Italy and the Italian communities

on all continents and the many international visitors who have spent varying lengths of time in Italy. This year, the focus is on New Zealand through 'Sicilian Art in New Zealand', an exhibition of contemporary works by Alessandro Bazan. The Bazan exhibition, part of the 150th Anniversary of the Unification of Italy Celebration, aims to raise awareness in New Zealand of the importance of the Sicilian cultural heritage, and encourage dialogue and strengthen relationships between Italy and New Zealand.

This initiative has been realised through the support of Regione Siciliana Assessorato Regionale per la famiglia le politiche, sociali e il lavoro – Dipartimento Lavoro Servizio Il Emigrazione ed Immigrazione in collaboration with Club Garibaldi, established in 1882, the oldest Italian Club in the Southern Hemisphere, the Centre for International Research and Management in Palermo, Sicily, and the Italian Chamber of Commerce in New Zealand Inc.

The 'Natura Exhibition' will run from Friday, 14 September through to Sunday, 23 September in Academy Gallery 3 at the New Zealand Academy of Fine Arts on Wellington's waterfront. The Gallery is open 10.00am to 5.00pm daily.

ITALIESE OR ENGLIANO?

A difficulty that Italians faced when they came to New Zealand was the inability to understand or speak the English language. In order to bridge the gap between Italian and English, the new immigrants developed a language which is known as Italiese (a blend of Italiano (Italian) and Inglese (English). The English and Italian words functioned both as a way to settle into a new environment but also as a way to maintain a connection with the Italian language. Italiese are words that stand in the middle of two languages and cultures. By making English words "Italianized", they become familiar and easy to integrate into the function of the language they grew up with. I love these altered words used by older Italians and also by my peers. How many of us when we visited Italy for the first time, thought we were speaking Italian when in fact it was Island Bay Italian – Italiaese!

I know our parents, family and friends used Italian words for fence or garage, but made the English word Italian sounding. There were no words in Italian to describe these new things... 'o scioppo' is something quite different than an Italian 'negozio', o 'checca' is certainly not an Italian torta and so on. Italiese has been part of my upbringing and it is slowly disappearing as younger Italo-New Zealanders learn purer Italian forms. I have started making a list of these 'italiese' words. 
In 1987 on the anniversary of the Sangro River Battle, three British veterans decided to form the Italy Star Association following their visit to the area.

When New Zealand forces arrived in Italy following the 1943 Armistice with the Allied forces, it was inevitable they would mingle with the local population. The Italians opened their homes and hearts to the New Zealand soldiers who delighted in finding young Italian signorinas everywhere.

In Love and War tells of the liaisons and love affairs of New Zealand soldiers and their Italian sweethearts during World War Two. For some the result was marriage, leading to a new and often strained life for the Italian war brides on the other side of the world. For others, their wartime romance ended in heartbreaking separation when the Kiwi soldiers were posted elsewhere or returned home. Unknowingly, some left behind children who would grow up without ever meeting their natural fathers. These touching stories of their romantic wartime encounters reveal the human side of war.

Evening Post – 20 July 1915 – Club Garibaldi

At the half-yearly meeting of the Club Garibaldi the vacancies in the offices of President and Vice-president resulting from the resignations of Messrs Joseph and John Vitetta, who are moving to Nelson, were filled by the election of Messrs Renai and Talamona. Mr A Paino was elected to the vacancy on the committee. It was decided to open a subscription list amongst Italian residents in aid of the widows and children of Italian soldiers who fall in the war. During the evening Mr Renai presented Mr Joseph Vitetta with a gold pendant as a mark of the appreciation of the members of his services to the club.

JOSEPH ZINO WINS NEW ZEALAND BOWLS SINGLES TITLE
