

A GLIMPSE INTO ~~~ PARTINICO

This month Partinico is featured, the area where Liliane Bonafede's father, Micheleangelo Bonafede was

born.

The origins of the ancient town of Partinico, situated in the province of Palermo, go back to around the third century AD. In Norman times the town was inhabited by Muslims who cultivated cotton and henna, the well-known red dye. According to the Arabian geographer Idrisi, the old village was destroyed after a battle between the Angevins and Aragonese, and then re-founded in 1309 by the Cistercian monks of Santa Maria di Altofone in Parco, who then improved the territory. The name Partinico derives from the Roman word Parthenicum, made up from Parthenos, which refers to a temple erected in honour of Diana, the goddess of hunting and of Inico, the original major town during the Sicanian reign.

The commune, which covers 11 hectares, has over 29,000 inhabitants, and sits 180 metres above sea level. The economy is driven by agriculture ~ specifically fruit, almonds, olives, grapes, foodstuffs and wine, as well as wooden and iron handcrafts. The inhabitants of Partinico are known as Partenicesi.

Preserved in the comunal archives is an important and historical letter hand-written by Giuseppe Garibaldi, dated 1866, in which he declares his acceptance of his citizenship of Partinico, and praises the courage shown by his fellow citizens during the struggle against their oppressors.

In the main street of the town centre, Corso dei Mille, stand many ancient buildings such as the 18th century Chiesa Madre, dedicated to Our Lady, Maria S.Annunziata and the Chiesa di San Giuseppe, which houses six 17th century paintings of the six stages in the life of St Joseph, and a baroque fountain which has eight outlets.

The Civic Museum holds an antiquarium which contains not only local archaeological finds, but also two floors of works by contemporary artists. In the anthropological section, an assortment of ancient instruments and sections of ancient Sicilian carts.

One of the most interesting and valuable monuments in Partinico is a small temple which houses the 'Assunta', a canvas painted by Antonio Spataford (1579-1594) which portrays the image of the Madonna being received into Heaven.

A BIT OF TRIVIA

ANSA - Rome - August 16, 2007



The world's biggest and smelliest flower has bloomed in Florence's botanical gardens. It is a rare event, since the species rarely flowers in cultivated situations, botanists said.

The Amorphophallus Titanum is better known as Titan Arum or Corpse Flower, due to the unpleasant smell it gives off to attract insects.

The plant was discovered by Italian botanist Odoardo Beccari, in the rain forests of Sumatra in 1878. It was the third time the smelly giant has flowered in Florence's gardens, with previous bloomings in 2002 and 2004.

When it blossomed on August 14, botanists said the Titan Arum flower had reached a height of 1.95 metres!

PROFILE OF VINCENZO DI MATTINA

It gives me pleasure to profile Vincenzo Di Mattina, one Club Garibaldi's most senior members. This article was dictated to me a couple of years ago, for the Stromboli Connection newsletter.

Ninety two years ago, on 5 May 1915, in Fico Grande, Stromboli, Francesca and Gaetano Di Mattina celebrated the birth of their son, Vincenzo.

After attending primary school and two years of elementary school, followed by another two years at a private school on the island, Vincenzo aged 15, departed the shores of Stromboli on 3 September 1930, to seek un buona fortuna.

As Vincenzo was very young, fellow Strombolano Giuseppe Panettieri, Angela (Cincotta) Panettieri's husband, was guarantor for him. Together, they travelled to Melbourne via the Suez Canal on the Orient Line ship 'Orvieto'. After a short stay in Melbourne, they boarded the Union Steamship 'Mahino' and arrived in Wellington on 17 October 1930.

During the 1930s depression, work was hard to come by, and eventually, Vincenzo found employment in a restaurant in Courtenay Place, Wellington. However, after eight months his employer was nearing bankruptcy and Vincenzo was made redundant. At that time, Vincenzo's older brother Guy was working for the Rabbit Board in Cambridge, and it was there he was able to find work.

Vince saved hard and in time bought a taxi in Otorohonga. After two years, he was called up for military service though he did not go to camp. Instead, he drove a truck for the government until Italy surrendered, after which time he was transferred to work in Bartolo Barnao's fish shop in Lambton Quay, Wellington. When the war ended he returned to Otorohonga, sold the taxi, and took a well-earned holiday in Australia.

In 1953, Vince returned to Stromboli for three months before coming back to Wellington, where he bought another taxi business and continued to work at this until his retirement in December 1990.

In 1954, Vince met his wife Ines at the Paino family home in Derwent Street, Island Bay. Both agreed the Paino family had successfully plotted to get them together! Their courtship had begun! At the end of 1954, Ines returned to her hometown, Olevano Romano, in Italy, to prepare for their wedding there on 12 February 1955. Following their marriage, the happy couple honey-mooned on their journey back to New Zealand.

Vince and Ines were blessed with two daughters, Angela born in 1956 and Marisa in 1959. Tragically, Angela was killed in an accident in 1991, aged 34 years. Marisa and her husband Rick have given Vince and Ines two beautiful grandchildren – Cara Francesca and Michael Vincenzo.

Since leaving Stromboli in 1930, Vince has returned several times to the land of his birth. Together with Ines, he celebrated his special milestone 90th birthday in 2005, in Melbourne, where their daughter, Marisa and her family live.

In retirement Vince and Ines still enjoy their garden, though these days, Ines does the hard work and Vince supervises! However, he was quick to tell me that he still prunes the grape vines each year!

Well done, guys! You did us proud! The Senior Christmas Luncheon was most successful with over 90 members attending, and a good time was had by all. This was followed by 45 children enjoying a wonderful day of fun, food and activities at the children's Christmas party. We were blessed with a fine day at the annual picnic in February, and encouraged by the many new faces amongst the 150 people who attended. Furthermore, the festival keeps on getting bigger and even more popular! This year's Festa Italia was the biggest to date, as well as financially. The first stage of the club refurbishment ... the foyer area, was completed.

At the end of March the club hosted an extremely successful dinner for the prominent Chairman of the National Italian American Foundation, his wife Barbara and son Antonio. Re-iterating his words: 'Your club community is the embodiment of all that is wonderful about our world-wide Italian culture. Thank you for your exceptional hospitality and friendship'. The month of May saw the closing of the very successful 'Qui Tutto Bene: The Italians in New Zealand' exhibition at Te Papa, after showing for $2\frac{1}{2}$ years, and which attracted over one million visitors since the opening. My sincere thanks to the outstanding members of the executive committee, Antonio Cacace, Marie Barnao, Robin Page, Maria Colucci, Lisa Devitt, John Cao, Martin Van der Donk and Mattio Amitrano, as well as the trustees: Paul Elenio and Armando Gilmoni, and legal advisor Rex Da Vanzo. Not only has it has been a pleasure working with you all, your support and help has been invaluable. Each executive committee member possesses unique talents, which were used as required. Many thanks to Antonio and Lisa who are standing down from their executive positions this year. Their support and help over the years, has been much appreciated.

Special thanks and appreciation go to our building manager, Salvi Gaeta. This is a huge job, as the building is over 40 years old and regular maintenance to plumbing and electrical is on-going. Rent is our major income, and it is certainly not easy keeping everyone happy, and ensuring that payments are made on time. We rent both the lower floors plus a storage area, and of course, the car parks.

Our club rooms are hired out for private functions, as well as to the Circolo Italiano, who hold regular Italian language classes, social functions and meetings.

Many thanks to the social committee, headed by Jo Gaeta and her team, including Salvi Gaeta, Maria Colucci, Lisa Devitt, Elizabeth Peek and Jane Di Mattina. This involves planning each function, organising food, setting up tables, and a lot of hard work. There are many others, too many to mention, who also pitch in during these functions and lend a hand ~ many thanks to you all.

Thanks also to Caterina Costa, who does a super job of looking after our membership registrations. This takes up many hours of her time and I can always rely on her to maintain an accurate data-base of contact information.
