Italians Build a Chocolate Igloo

At the Euro-Chocolate Fetival in Perugia, four Italians constructed what they believe is the world's first full-sized chocolate igloo, but they have not yet solved the age-old problem it melts! So to help stop this from happening, the igloo is kept indoors.

"It was really hard work, much more difficult than building a snow igloo" Marco Fanti, 45, told reporters, as he stood beside the 1.65 metre high, 3,600 kilogram, dome shaped igloo, made from 10 kilogram blocks of chocolate.

It took Fanti and his fellow instructors, who worked with crumbling and melting chocolate, twenty three hours to build, which is believed to be the world's first chocolate igloo yet it took only four hours to build a snow igloo.

Associazone Eolani Nel Mondo (AEM)

I would like to share another 'chapter' of my recent travels to Italy, the third visit in six years!

For those who are not aware, Stromboli is one of seven islands in an archipelago, known as the Aeolian Islands, Province of Messina, and its people called Aeolians. Since the late 1800's mass exodus has occurred, with thousands leaving to start new lives in other parts of Italy, Europe, the Americas, Australia, and a smaller group compared to other destinations, New Zealand.

Today, populations of Aeolians worldwide have grown immensely. In fact, there are thousands of second, third and even fourth generations, who have remained strongly linked to common roots, family ties, memories and all that make up their cultural heritage, traditions and values that form a specific 'Aeolian identity'. From these basic points, the proposal of the Centro Studi e Richerche di Storia e Problemi Eoliani was born, so as to create a meeting and reference point for all Aeolians throughout the world, the Associazone Eolani Nel Mondo, of which I am a foundation member.

In 2004, Robin and I travelled to Italy for the second time. During this visit, the Mayor of Lipari and a group of counsellors from the Municipio welcomed a very large group of NZ Strombolani descendants at a reception given in our honour. Following formalities, an open forum took place where we were able to share our thoughts, suggestions and ideas. At its conclusion, Maria Francesca Te Huki and I, both of Wellington, were interviewed by Southern Italian Television, for a segment on a current affairs programme.

We returned for the third time in September 2006, and were once again, guests of AEM in Lipari, who were hosting a reception and luncheon for 40 American Strombolani descendants. My friend Maria, from New York, had travelled from the States with the group and it was here at the AEM headquarters, where Maria and I met for the very first time, after 7 years of corresponding and telephone calls ~ a wonderful and very emotional meeting! After a few short speeches given by the Vice President of AEM, Sonia D'Ambra, Migration Historian from University of Messina, Professor Marcello Saija, Maria and myself, we were each presented with a beautiful single rose. Later, Maria and I were interviewed by Southern Italian Television for a 15 minute segment, on how our 'chance meeting' over the internet led to the very strong friendship and bond we share with each other today, as well as our immense love for the Aeolian Islands, especially Stromboli.

Glimpse into ~~~Pistoia - a gem of Tuscany

This month Pistoia is featured, the area where the father of Elsa Barsi Forti and Gino Barsi was born. 26 miles out of Florence and the birthplace of Mauro Barsi, who as you may recall, was heavily involved with Club Garibaldi for many years.

18km northwest of Prato and also capital of its own province, is one of the least visited cities in Tuscany – an unjustified ranking for this quiet, well-preserved medieval city just 35 minutes by train from Florence (and about the same by bus).

An important metalworking centre, it left a legacy to the world in the pistole, originally the name of a dagger but later the title given to the first local firearms.

In Roman times, this medieval town was known as Pistoria. The word 'pistol' comes from the town, first from the blades that were made there, and later from the guns. In medieval days the city was torn between the warring Bianchi and Neri factions. Today the streets in the center of town are grey and empty and quiet, even in the sweltering summer heat.

Typically referred to as a 'town', it is actually a city with a large population.

Spedale del Ceppo

Founded in the 13th century and still a working hospital today, the Spedale del Ceppo (literally, Hospital of the Tree Stump) has a glorious early-16th-century exterior terra-cotta frieze begun by Giovanni della Robbia (1469-1529) and completed by the workshop of Santi and Benedetto Buglioni in 1526-28.





For the child in us all, a visit to the Collodi Gardens in Pistoia is a must! The gardens are beautifully laid out and is a mass of colour in summer. There are several sculptures which reflect some aspect of the story of *Pinocchio*.

PASSAPORTO ELETTRONICO

COMUNICATO STAMPA

Dal 26 ottobre 2006 l'Ambasciata d'Italia a Wellington rilascia un nuovo modello di passaporto, di tipo elettronico, utilizzando più moderne tecnologie che offrono standard più elevati di sicurezza.

Il passaporto elettronico è dotato di particolari caratteristiche di stampa anticontraffazione e di un microprocessore che consente la registrazione dei dati, certificati elettronicamente, riguardanti il titolare del documento e l'Autorità che lo ha rilasciato. Un ulteriore dato – relativo alle impronte digitali – potrà essere, in futuro, inserito nel microprocessore.

Il costo del nuovo passaporto, in ragione della sofisticata tecnologia utilizzata, è stato fissato da un decreto emanato, in data 9 maggio 2006, dal Ministero dell'Economia: in euro 44,66 per il libretto con 32 pagine (pari a NZ\$ 87.50) ed in euro 45,62 per quello di 48.

La tassa annuale di concessione governativa rimane invariata (attualmente pari a NZ\$ 78.80).

L'emissione del nuovo documento di viaggio, previsto da un impegno comune europeo, consentirà di continuare a beneficiare del *Visa Waiver Program* che autorizza l'ingresso negli Stati Uniti od il transito nei suoi aeroporti senza necessità di visto.

Dal 26 ottobre 2006 potranno pertanto entrare o transitare negli Stati Uniti in esenzione di visto i titolari di passaporto elettronico, di passaporto con foto digitale rilasciato prima del 26 ottobre 2006 (le Rappresentanze diplomatiche non hanno rilasciato tale tipo di documento) o di passaporto a lettura ottica rilasciato o rinnovato prima del 26 ottobre 2005. Per i passaporti rilasciati dalle Rappresentanze diplomatiche italiane tra il 26 ottobre 2005 al 25 ottobre 2006 e' necessario, per l'ingresso o il transito negli Stati Uniti, il relativo visto.

Si ricorda che i figli minori potranno beneficiare del *Visa Waiver Program* solo se dotati di un passaporto individuale, non essendo sufficiente l'iscrizione sul passaporto di uno dei genitori.
